# IN THE WORKS: EXCITING EARLY OUTREACH PROJECTS!

The 5<sup>th</sup> and 6<sup>th</sup> grade Eagles' Club group that Higher Education staff oversee to promote Early College Career Readiness have teamed up with the SRPMIC Cultural Resources Department for traditional gardening projects this spring.

Community Garden managers Ansom Collins and Jonathan Curry visited SRES on March 3 to introduce students to the many plants, flowers, foods, and traditional gardening methods of the O'odham and Piipaash peoples.





On March 7, we took a field trip to the Community Garden so students could see it first-hand.

Approximately 18 students and four chaperones participated, including Erica Outcalt and Denelle Prieto (Higher Education program advisors and Eagles' Club volunteers); Taté Walker (Salt River Schools Communications & PR Director and Eagles' Club volunteer); and Joweitta Cannon (Salt River Schools Transportation & Facilities Manager). The students had fun exploring, taking photos, and picking/tasting lemons and "limequats" (a tiny fruit fusion of limes and

kumquats). The Community Garden staff (Ansom Collins and Stetson Mendoza) had fun showing students around, posing with all the growing plants, and teaching students to make "natural" plant darts to toss at each other.

Eagles' Club students had so much fun that we returned to the Community Garden on March 28 and were treated to a fresh lettuce salad (straight from Stetson's own garden) and a special soup that students had to guess what meat they were eating (it was rabbit and they LOVED IT!). The goal for Eagles' Club students is to plant a raised bed garden on school grounds so it can be tended to when students are on summer break. While our partnership with the Community Garden is our focus, Eagles' Club students have also learned about careers in the fields of medicine, business, hospitality, poetry, sports, and more!



# WHAT ARE SCHOLARSHIPS?

A scholarship is **FREE** money given to you to help pay for your school expenses (tuition, dorm room, books, etc.). Scholarships do not need to be paid back, but they sometimes have requirements, such as a minimum Grade Point Average (GPA) that students must maintain in order to continue receiving the funding.

They can be awarded for many things, such as being the first in your family to go to college, being left-handed, having a pet dog, etc. Scholarships can help you cover the things that Higher Ed does not cover, such as paying for your dorm or meal plan. When applying for a scholarship, sometimes you will be asked to write a personal statement or submit a letter of recommendation.

It is important to give yourself plenty of time to work on the application before the deadline. You can find a list of scholarships and search engines on our website. As always, if you need help finding and applying for scholarships, feel free to reach out to Higher Ed. We are here to help!

## **ACADEMIC vs. VOCATIONAL**

Students often ask, "What is the difference between an academic and vocational school?"

Academic schools are comprised of community colleges and universities. Within these institutions students may obtain associate degrees, bachelor degrees, master degrees, and doctoral degrees. These institutions usually have a regional accreditation. Accrediting agencies oversee institutions and how they administer their programs and ensure a quality education.

Examples of academic institutions: Scottsdale Community College, Mesa Community College, Phoenix College, Arizona State University, University of Arizona, and Northern Arizona University, among others. Some of the pathways or degrees that you can get include accounting, business, computer science, education, history, law, psychology, and sociology — just to name a few!

Vocational schools have a different educational focus to provide students with job skills for a specific trade. Within these institutions students may obtain certificates, diplomas, and sometimes associate and bachelor degrees. Vocational schools usually have national accreditation.

Examples of vocational institutions: Arizona College, Avalon Institute, Empire Beauty School, The Refrigeration School, Inc., East Valley Institute of Technology, and Universal Technical Institute, among others. Some of the pathways, including certificates and degrees, are in allied health fields (such as medical billing and coding), certified nursing assistant, and other skilled trades, such as cosmetology, esthetics, electrician, plumber, automotive technician, welding, etc.
